Before she came to the Sail Loft, **Christine Mitchell** (X32) never thought one of her favorite pastimes – sewing – would have a direct connection to her job at Newport News Shipbuilding.

"I love to sew," she said. "If anybody had told me that I would be sewing in the shipyard, I probably wouldn't have believed it."

Mitchell is among the more than 40 shipbuilders who work in the Sail Loft and Pad Shop. The huge bow flags made for submarine christenings are perhaps the shop's most recognizable product. However, the shop's work goes far beyond bow flags and plays a vital role in keeping shipbuilders and Navy sailors safe.

"So much work comes out of here, but a lot of people don't even know we're here," said **Stephen Riddick** (X32), who also works in the Sail Loft. "It's actually pretty neat work."

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Sail Loft and Pad Shop shipbuilders are responsible for making containments that protect shipbuilders as well as insulation pads that protect sailors from heat created by components on submarines and aircraft carriers. Riddick recalled a two-story containment tent built for USS *Gerald R. Ford* (CVN 78).

M40 General Foreman **Jesse Wyatt** praised the shipbuilders for their commitment to quality. "It's a direct credit to the craftsmen and craftswomen working up here," he said.

The shop historically has depended upon "tribal knowledge" to build a lot of things for which standard drawings don't exist.

However, Wyatt said there is a push to create drawings and how-to guides to capture knowledge.

Cybersecurity to Launch Newsletter

As the builder of the most advanced warships in the world, Newport News Shipbuilding faces constant cyber-attacks from hostile nations, spies and criminals. To help educate shipbuilders – who are the company's first line of defense against such attacks – Cybersecurity (T51) is launching a quarterly publication.

The newsletter – *Cyber N2K*, or need-toknow – will inform shipbuilders about cyber news, events and training opportunities. It will provide information about current attack strategies and how shipbuilders can combat them at work and at home.

NNS' Cybersecurity team uses sophisticated tools to protect the company's IT infrastructure and information assets from attacks. However, 90 percent of successful cyber-attacks worldwide in recent years have been initiated through phishing emails. This concern has prompted the Cybersecurity team to increase efforts to partner with and educate shipbuilders about cyber threats.

Hackers no longer just target companies. They target individuals at all levels and are intent on stealing critical data, disrupting business and threatening national security. *Cyber N2K* will be available on the Cybersecurity website and provide updates to help shipbuilders protect critical data at work and at home.

REMINDER: Non-Tobacco Users Must Update Status by June 30

United Steelworkers, NNS Guards and salaried employees enrolled in an HII medical plan must update their tobacco-use status to "tobacco-free" by Sunday, June 30, to qualify for a tobacco-free discount. If shipbuilders do not use tobacco or have completed a tobacco cessation program, they qualify for a \$660 annual discount on their medical premium.
